### Sabrina Sy Earns 3rd Place in San Mateo

Sabrina Sy, our branch's entrant in the Eleanor Stem Allen Memorial Speech Contest, was awarded third place at the state-wide final competition, held during the April 22 AAUW CA Annual Meeting in San Mateo.

Sabrina delivered her speech on "Is it Time to Pass the Equal Rights Amendment" to about 120 attendees. A sophomore at Mark Keppel High School, Sabrina received a \$500 stipend for her future studies.

The first Speech Trek final competition was held at the April 2007 state convention. This year's competition was the toughest in the ten years of the speech contest. There was a record number of entrants, and the quality of the finalists' speeches was unexcelled in the contest's history.

Our branch has participated every year and has had finalists place among the top three on six occasions: Peggy Truong (3rd in 2007), Tiffany Chia (3rd in 2008), Alexandra Lossada (2nd in 2009), PavinTrinh (1st in 2013), Sharon Lu (1st in 2016) and Sabrina Sy (3rd in 2017).

First place was awarded to Nikhita Gopisetty, a sophomore at Oakwood High School in Morgan Hill. Second place was awarded to Sarah Murphy, a senior at Whitney High School in Rocklin. This year's 4th place winner is Jocelyn Tzeng, sponsored by the La Mesa/El Cajon Branch, and 5th place is Kathy Le, sponsored by the Sacramento Branch.

# Elena Velarde to Dine with the Dotys

### **Public Policy**

### Proposed AAUW CA Public Policy Action Priorities for 2017-2019

The AAUW CA Public Policy program supports its mission to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research, and complements the national Public Policy program. AAUW CA's priorities for action are chosen according to the criteria of viability, critical need, and strong member support. All members were invited to comment regarding the priorities that AAUW CA should place on California legislation affecting women and girls during the next two years,

and these priorities reflect member comments. Members vote to accept or reject the priorities during the AAUW California Election.

Voting began April 22nd and ends on May 12th. Be sure to vote!

## To achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women AAUW CA advocates:

- Pay equity, fairness in compensation, benefits, and economic justice.
- Equitable access and advancement in employment, including vigorous enforcement of employment antidiscrimination statutes.
- Strengthening retirement benefits and programs, including pension improvements, and protecting Social Security from privatization or reduction in benefits.
- Programs that provide women with education, including financial literacy, training, and support for success in the workforce.
- Strengthening programs that encourage career development and earning potential, including career and technical education, access to postsecondary education, and welfare job training.
- Policies that promote and support work-life balance, including child and dependent care.

### To support a strong system of high-quality public education, AAUW CA advocates:

- Adequate and equitable funding for high-quality public education for all students, including preschool.
- Increased support for programs that break through barriers for women and girls in science, technol-

- ogy, engineering, and math (STEM) fields.
- Protection of programs that meet the needs of girls and women in all levels of education, including sexual health education.
- Vigorous enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights laws pertaining to education.
- Opposition to the use of public funds for nonpublic elementary and secondary education, and for charter schools that do not adhere to the same civil rights and accountability standards as required of other public schools.
- Support for and adequate funding that gives women and disadvantaged populations access to higher education, including two-year degree programs and vocational training.

## To guarantee equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse society, AAUW CA advocates:

- Self- determination of one's reproductive health decisions.
- Freedom from violence and fear of violence, including bully-

ing, sexual harassment, human trafficking, and gun violence, in all aspects of life.

- Increased access to quality, affordable healthcare, and family planning services.
- Strengthening California programs, including affordable housing, that improve the lives of children in families living at or below the poverty level.
- Support for United Nations programs that address human rights and women's and girls' issues.
- Freedom in definition of self and family, and guarantee of civil rights for all family structures.
- Vigorous protection of and full access to civil and constitutional rights for all.

The AAUW CA Public Policy Committee recommends these Public Policy Priorities for approval by AAUW CA members.



Ove is a curmudgeon the kind of man who points at people he dislikes as if they were burglars caught outside his bedroom window. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse. People call him "the bitter neighbor from hell." However, behind the cranky exterior there is a story and a sadness. So when one November morning a chatty young couple with two

chatty young daughters move in next door and accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox, it is the lead-in to a comical and heartwarming tale of unkempt cats, unexpected friendship, and the ancient art of backing up a U-Haul. ### Three Short Plays

Thanks to a record attendance, our April reading of Agatha Christie's *A Witness for the Defense* was very successful.

On May 8 we will read three short plays selected by New York theatre critics, professionals, and the editorial staff of Samuel French, Inc. as the most important plays of the Fifth Off-Off Broadway Original Short Play Festival sponsored by Love Creek Productions in 1980: *Batbrains* by Barbara Daniel, *Hello, Ma!* by Trude Stone, and *Me Too, Then!* by Tom Dudzick and Steven Smith.

Batbrains. Jane Batts is an up-and-coming fashion designer who lives in a loft with her husband Rico, a successful artist. Until now, Rico has been paying most of the bills - but Jane has a chance to break out on her own with a series of bat shaped dress designs. However, she first must contend with her old college roommate, Pam, a self-proclaimed psychic who has arrived in New York to teach "telepathic lovemaking" - and plans to crash with Jane for awhile. Will Pam's "visions" reveal something more about Rico? A short comedy about two very different women, seeking success in the big city. Published in Off Off Broadway Festival Plays, 5th Series.

*Hello, Ma!* Dee's a self-centered 20-something who has a chronic addiction to calling her mother with her problems, until her mother flips the switch and teaches her a lesson. Hello, Ma! is an amusing comedy about mothers and daughters that offers tow hilarious roles for talented actresses.

Me Too, Then! In this short award-winning comedy, Vera tries to overcome her dependence on material goods and discovers that laughter is the key. Vera is a hopeful romantic and comedy fan who lives with her pharmacist boyfriend, Leonard, and her chatty bird, Harpo. When Slats, a comedian, comes into her life, she must decide whether to be loyal to Leonard or to follow her dreams of comedy. A humorous, light-hearted romp through love, Me Too, Then! offers lessons about happiness and being true to yourself.
