Local High School Students Speak Up

How Can We

Stand Up To Sexism?

11:00 AM on Saturday, February 10 in the Asbury Lounge of the Alhambra's First United Methodist Church (9 N. Almansor St.)

How can we stand up to sexism? What can individuals and organizations such as AAUW do to break down stereotypes and biases in school, at work, in the military, and in our communities? On Saturday, February 10, some very bright, insightful, eloquent high school students will provide their answers in the first phase of AAUW California's Eleanor Stem Allen Memorial Speech Trek.

Speech Trek is an annual speaking contest open to all California high school students, whether from public, private, home or continuation high schools. Students prepare an original 5-6-minute speech, which is judged for content, organization, and delivery. The best speech will be posted online to be judged for the next level.

The state Speech Trek judges will identify five finalists, two of whom will receive honorable mention. The judges

will award the 4th place finalist with \$250 and the 5th place finalist with \$150. The top three finalists compete for cash prizes at the AAUW California state convention in Irvine on April 28, 2018. First place winner at the State contest will receive \$1500, second place will receive \$1000, and third place will receive \$500. Travel expenses, lodging, and meals for each finalist and a chaperone will be reimbursed by Speech Trek.

The first Speech Trek final competition was held at the April 2007 state convention. AAUW's Alhambra--San Gabriel Branch branch has participated every year and has had finalists place among the top three on six occassions: Peggy Truong (3rd in 2007), Tiffany Chia (3rd in 2008), Alexandra Lossada (2nd in 2009), PavinTrinh (1st in 2013), Sharon Lu (1st in 2016, pictured right) and Sabrina Sy (3rd in 2017, pictured left).

AAUW CA Articles of Incorporation Vote Failed

As of January 22nd, 2018 the vote to change AAUW California back to a Public Benefit Corporation failed due to four "no" votes.

As explained in the pre-vote materials and on the ballot, just one "no" vote causes the measure to fail per California Corporate regulations governing Mutual Benefit Corporations (our current classification). Our pre-vote materials extensively explained the ramifications of a "no" vote and its long-term impact to the organization. We are now facing a lengthy and expensive legal process to reclassify AAUW CA to a Public Benefit Corpora-

tion. The ballot measure members recently voted on was the most efficient and cost-effective process. AAUW CA must be reclassified, one way or another, in order to remain an affiliate of AAUW and to participate in all AAUW programs, including Tech Trek.

Any member who cast a "no" vote has the opportunity to change that vote to a "yes" vote up until February 10, 2018, by contacting governance@aauw-ca.org and requesting that their vote be changed. After that date, AAUW CA will move into a complex and costly appeal process with the State of California.

This year's Pasadena Showcase House of Design is a 12,00 square foot house built in 1915 on 1.6 acres in Altadena. The house will be open to the public every day except Mondays from April 22 through May 20, 2018.

Volunteers are needed to staff the house and grounds Tuesday through Sunday. The staffing is split into two shifts: 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM, and 2:00 PM to 6:00 PM. A third shift, 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM, is needed on Thursdays, Fridays and some Wednesdays.

Our branch will earn \$40 for each four-hour shift we fill. Volunteers who work two shifts will receive a free entrance ticket to tour the house.

We hope to staff at least 20 shifts. Please volunteer for as many shifts as you can and help us recruit others. Volunteers do not have to be AAUW members--family and friends can help too!

We will have a very short window of time to work with Showcase House to get the shifts you prefer, so please tell us your preferred shifts and two alternate shifts as soon as possible but no later than February 23. 

Robert Langdon, Harvard professor of symbology and religious iconology, arrives at the ultramodern Guggenheim Museum Bilbao to attend a major announcement—the unveiling of a discovery that "will change the face of science forever." The evening's host is Edmond Kirsch, a forty-year-old billionaire and futurist whose dazzling high-tech inventions and auda-

cious predictions have made him a renowned global figure. Kirsch, who was one of Langdon's first students at Harvard two decades earlier, is about to reveal an astonishing breakthrough . . . one that will answer two of the fundamental questions of human existence.

As the event begins, Langdon and several hundred guests find themselves captivated by an utterly original presentation, which Langdon realizes will be far more controversial than he ever imagined. But the meticulously orchestrated evening suddenly erupts into chaos, and Kirsch's precious discovery teeters on the brink of being lost forever. Reeling and facing an imminent threat, Langdon is forced into a desperate bid to escape Bilbao. With him is Ambra Vidal, the elegant museum director who worked with Kirsch to stage the provocative event. Together they flee to Barcelona on a perilous quest to locate a cryptic password that will unlock Kirsch's secret.

Navigating the dark corridors of hidden history and extreme religion, Langdon and Vidal must evade a tormented enemy whose all-knowing power seems to emanate from Spain's Royal Palace itself . . . and who will stop at nothing to silence Edmond Kirsch. On a trail marked by modern art and enigmatic symbols, Langdon and Vidal uncover clues that ultimately bring them face-to-face with Kirsch's shocking discovery . . . and the breathtaking truth that has long eluded us.


Drama Group February 12 Dead Man's Cell Phone

yssey of a woman forced to confront her own assumptions about morality, redemption, and the need to connect in a technologically obsessed world.
