### Tech Trek Reminder

The Tech Trek program sends twelve and thirteen yearold middle school girls to an inspiring weeklong STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) camp at a college or university. Begun in California in 1998 with one school, Tech Trek is now at eight colleges and universities in California. It also has become a National AAUW Program open to many young women in other states.

The Alhambra/San Gabriel branch sponsors two Tech Treks: Tech North and Tech Trek South. Tech Trek is a 501(c)(3) organization so contributions are tax deductible.

Tech Trek North services Alhambra schools that are north of the #10 Freeway and Tech Trek South services Alhambra schools south of the #10 Freeway and the Montebello schools.

Both Tech Trek groups raise funds for scholarship through donations.

She has exhibited at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art where an alter is on permanent display, the Japanese American National Museum, the National Museum of Mexican Art, and at the first Day of the Dead exhibit in Glasgow, Scotland. She served as a cultural consultant on the Day of the Dead-themed Oscar-winning Disney film "Coco."

# The Heart of AAUW

"Nowhere has the AAUW demonstrated its practical idealism and its educational power and promise more fully than in the establishment of fellowships to advance women who give promise of scholarly distinction."

I consider the Fund and its fellowships and grants to be at the heart of AAUW. Over \$4,000,000 is awarded each year from the interest on completed endowments. When a grant or fellowship (endowment) is initiated, up to 10 years is allowed to complete the full funding of the principle so that the interest can be awarded.

New members may not know (but I expect long time members to know) that Alhambra-San Gabriel Branch established a Research and Projects (R&P) Grant in 1986. At that time, \$35,000 was required to fully fund a Research and Projects Grant. Thanks to donations from members and creative fund raising, including specifying that \$2 of each members' branch dues would go to the Fund<sup>1</sup>, we completed funding the Alhambra-San Gabriel R&P Grant in 3 years!

Although Alhambra-San Gabriel Branch has fully funded its eponymous R&P Grant, there are more fellowships and grants from California that are only partially funded. Full funding is required before the money can be put to work. The more endowments that are completed, the more money AAUW can award. "Dining with the Dotys" was started to help complete California endowments.

Dining with the Dotys has brought in almost \$4,000 in the three years it has been going. Let's see if we can raise \$2,000 or more this year so even more endowments are completed. To achieve that goal, I invite everyone to pick up a packet of tickets and sell them to your friends and family. Who knows? When your friend wins, they may invite you as one of the guests! Help our fund raiser grow and maybe there could be \$5,000,000 in AAUW Fund awards next year!

AAUW trivia for November: Did you know that in 1950 Senator Joseph McCarthy (R-WI) accused AAUW of being a communist front? AAUW leaders successfully defended against these allegations.

# **Public Policy**

October 13<sup>th</sup> was the last day for Governor Newsome to sign or veto the bills sent to him from the legislature. AAUW CA was following 30 bills and 7 resolutions. All of the resolutions were adopted. These included designating Women and Girls in STEM Week, proclaiming April 2<sup>nd</sup> 2019 as Equal Pay Day, and proclaiming March 2019 Women's History Month.

Of the 30 bills, 10 have been converted to 2-year bills, meaning they will be taken up again in 2020, two were vetoed in the Assembly and one was placed in "suspense." The bill placed in suspense is AB31 which would exempt menstrual products from sales taxes. Any bill costing more than \$150,000 is sent to the suspense file and when taken from that file is voted on without further testimony. I have not been able to determine the current status of AB31 – it may have become a 2-year bill or died in suspense. The remaining 17 bills AAUW CA was following were sent to the Governor and signed into law. ### California 2020 Women's Suffrage Project

The California 2020 Women's Suffrage Project has been created to support efforts to celebrate the Centennial of the 19th Amendment. Through coordinated efforts, the project will use education and civic engagement to connect with the past and inspire communities for the future. This statewide effort invites local communities and organizations to join us for the Centennial events and programming that will kick off on the 100th anniversary of California's ratification of the 19th Amendment. The official start date for Centennial Celebrations will begin November 1, 2019, and continue through 2020 with some programs and resources to continue beyond 2020.

The CA 2020 Women's Suffrage Project and the National Women's History Alliance have partnered with the National Vote for Women's Trail to document and bring recognition to the women's suffrage movement between the years 1848-1920. The trail is co-sponsored by two notable nonprofits dedicated to the preservation of historical landmarks; the National Collaborative for Women's History Sites (NCWHS) and the Pomeroy Foundation.

Under the National Votes for Women's Trail initiative, the state of California has the opportunity to designate key suffrage locations across the state and nominate five key historic locations in California for a Pomeroy Marker. The CA 2020 Project's plan is to form a selection committee in October to recommend five historic landmarks to receive a Pomeroy Marker.

# **Branch History**

In 1944 in spite of, or perhaps because of World War II, a group of educated women gathered together in the West San Gabriel Valley to organize a branch of a national woman's organization – the American Association of University Women. The minutes of that organizing meeting indicate that the organizers thought a good temporary name for this new branch would be the Alhambra-San Gabriel Branch. Seventy-five years later that temporary name seems to have stuck and here we are, still working for education and equity for women and girls!

Other items from that first meeting in April of 1944 included a preference for evening meetings over daytime meetings and the desire to include "Recent Graduates" in the main group rather than have a separate organization. I, for one, am grateful to the women who gathered "for the purpose of organizing a new branch of the A.A.U.W." because I have gotten to know all of you and am able to support a mission in which I fully believe: To advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy.

### Did You Know...?

Our Alhambra-San Gabriel Branch was founded in **1944**, same year as my entry into the world! Back then, gasoline was 21¢ a gallon (and they checked the tires and engine fluids and cleaned the windshield for free). A loaf of bread was 9¢ and a first class postage stamp was 3¢.

In **1985**, our Branch was forty-one years young and we paid \$1.09 for gasoline, \$1.00 for bread and 22¢ for postage.

This year, **2019**, our Branch's 75<sup>th</sup> Diamond Jubilee Anniversary, we pay these prices:

Gasoline, \$2.25 (average everywhere but CA); Bread, \$2.19 (Sara Lee white); and postage is 55¢.

#### November 11 Drama Group



*Disgraced* is a 2012 play by novelist and screenwriter Ayad Akhtar. The play is centered on sociopolitical themes such as Islamophobia and the self-identity of Muslim-American citizens. It focuses on a dinner party between four people with very different backgrounds. As discussion turns to politics and religion, the mood quickly becomes heated. Described as a "combustible powder keg

of identity politics," the play depicts racial and ethnic prejudices that "secretly persist in even the most progressive cultural circles." It is also said to depict the challenge for upwardly mobile Muslim Americans in the post-9/11 America. Productions have included performances by Aasif Mandvi and Erik Jensen.
