Remembering the Past- Rockin' the Future

News from Our State Leaders

Here's a sampling of the events planned for the 2020 AAUW California convention at the Westin San Francisco Airport, April 17-19.

We will meet some women from the past who have had a great impact on our lives. Did you know that the first woman to run for President of the United States was Victoria Woodhull? She believed that women already had the right to vote because the 14th and 15th amendments had given all citizens the right to vote. In 1872, she selected the former slave and abolitionist leader Frederick Douglass as her running mate and made an attempt to run for the highest office in our land, but the government refused to put their names on the ballot.

After she and her sister made a fortune as stockbrokers, they started a newspaper that advocated, among other things, sex education, short skirts, and women's suffrage. Perhaps you will run into Ms. Woodhull at the convention or maybe you will see the great suffragist, Elizabeth Cady Stanton or the brave and wonderful Harriet Tubman.

Our AAUW Fund workshop, "The New and the Tried and True" will feature Heather Miller, National Advancement Director and members of the California Fund Committee. There will be an opportunity to ask questions and share ideas for fundraising.

We surpassed our goal of \$500,000 with a total of \$500,717.80! The AAUW Fund Gala will celebrate the 10 top branches that contributed to AAUW Fund, based on both total amount donated and amount per capita. The 2019 State Named Gift Honoree will be revealed.

The Communications Committee will present an arsenal of publicity tools to get the word out about branch events to your members and the public at the AAUW California convention. You'll hear about some tried and true methods as well as some new and different techniques. Costumes might be involved!

Convention attendees can join in the fight for equity for women and girls by participating in Saturday's Days for Girls event. Days for Girls is an international non-profit that prepares and distributes sustainable menstrual

health solutions to girls who would otherwise miss school during their monthly periods. We invite you to join in the effort by donating kit materials or participate in the Days for Girls session to assemble hygiene kits on Saturday morning at the convention. If you can't attend the convention you can give kit materials to a branch member who plans to attend. The current list includes: Deanna Arthur, Jim Doty, Kathleen Doty, Joe DesBarres, Betty Morin, Jane Krauss, Janice Lee or Elena Velarde.

Kit materials:

- Girls' 100% cotton undies in sizes 10, 12, 14 or 16. Briefs, hipsters or bikini styles (no boy shorts or thongs). Darker colors, floral, geometric are best. No faces or eyes. Note: white undies and washcloths are often included in packages you purchase. These can be dyed a darker color.
- Small travel-sized soaps
- Dark washcloths

Molly MacGregor: Women's History Month

Molly MacGregor, along with several other women from Sonoma County, California, organized the nation's first Women's History Day 40 years ago. Her idea grew into a national event that led to Women's History Month. It was ratified by U.S. President Jimmy Carter and enacted by Congress. In 1981, Senator Orrin Hatch and Representative Barbara Mikulski presented resolutions to Congress designating March 8 as Women's History Week. In 1987, Congress designated the entire month of March as Women's History Month. Since then, MacGregor and the National Women's History Project have worked tirelessly to carry the movement forward.

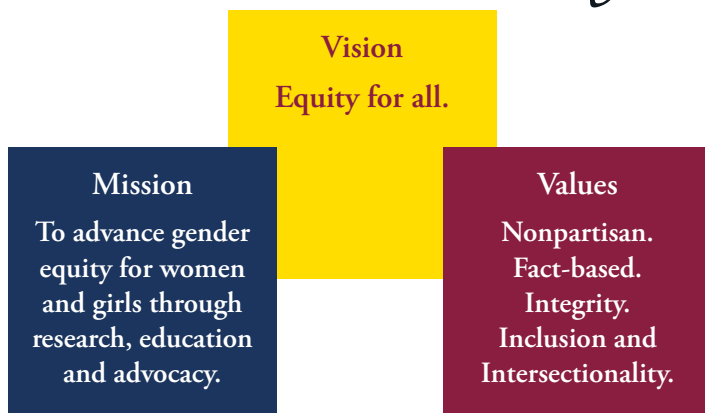

Equal Pay Day – Wear Red

The next Equal Pay Day is Tuesday, March 31, 2020. This date symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year. The National Committee on Pay Equity <https://www.pay-equity.org/day.html> reminds us to wear red to symbolize how far women and minorities are “in the red” with their pay. This is a great idea for branch members working Equal Pay Day tables in their communities or at local colleges.

AAUW’s updated publication *The Simple Truth* is based on the most recently released data from the U.S. Census Bureau. In 2018, women received just 82 cents for every dollar paid to a man. Women of color often face a wider gap compared to white men; black women make 62 cents on the dollar; and latin@s make 54 cents on the dollar. The pay gap has only decreased by a nickel in the 21st Century. On the national level, the *Paycheck Fairness Act* passed the House of Representatives and languishes in the Senate with no action yet taken. The Equal Pay Act requires that men and women be given equal pay for equal work in the same establishment. The jobs need not be identical, but they must be substantially equal. It is job content, not job titles, that determines whether jobs are substantially equal. Specifically, the Equal Pay Act provides that employers may not pay unequal wages to men and women who perform jobs that require substantially equal skill, effort and responsibility, and that are performed under similar working conditions within the same establishment.

According to WAGE (Women Are Getting Even), women earn one million less than men in their lifetime. AAUW has facilitated Start Smart and Work Smart workshops to help close the gap, and you can learn more about these workshops at the website: <https://www.pay-equity.org/day-kit.html>. AAUW now offers an online one-hour Work Smart workshop accessed from the www.aauw.org for salary negotiation skills.

March is a good time to reflect on all the good AAUW does in its efforts to attain education and equity for women and girls. Above all, the AAUW Fund makes it possible to assist women get advanced degrees and education in alternative professions through its Fellowships and Grants; to provide leadership guidance to college women through the National Conference of College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL); to work for pay equity through Work Smart and Start Smart; to assist in legal cases fighting gender bias in the workplace and much more. Alhambra-San Gabriel Branch has a long history of supporting the Fund and I hope you all will continue that support by purchasing Dining with the Dotys raffle tickets again this year. Tickets will be available at all branch functions up to the Annual Meeting when the winner will be drawn. 100% of the proceeds go to the Fund – an easy way to show your support with the possibility of a wonderful meal and evening with friends.

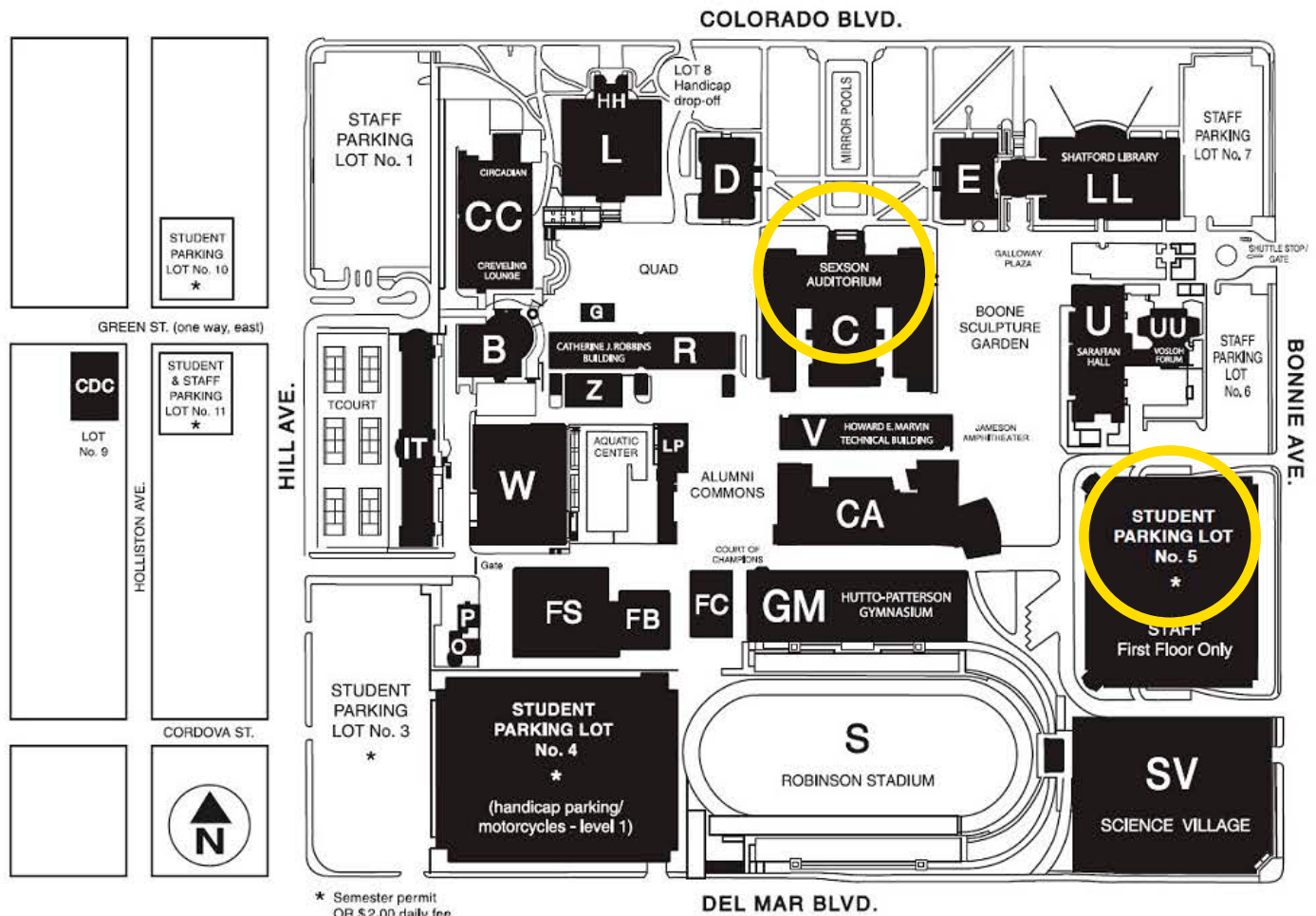

Are men and women truly equal today, or are the suffragists of 1920 still suffering in 2020? On Saturday, February 8th, thirteen very bright, insightful, eloquent high school students provided their answers in the first phase of AAUW California's Eleanor Stem Allen Memorial Speech Trek. The top five contestants were:

The following students, listed in random order, also spoke: Khin Han (12th grade, Gabrielino High), Lin Knudsen (12th grade, Gabrielino High), Jayden Chow (9th grade, San Gabriel High), Jasmine Luong (9th grade, San Gabriel High), Mikaela Perez-Beltran (10th grade, Alhambra High), Shruti Chand (S. Pasadena High), Jessica Lieu (Alhambra High) and Diany Wang (10th grade, Alhambra High). Esther Xu, a student attending Ramona Convent Secondary School, entered the competition but was unable to speak due to illness.

Upon later review of Katherine Xie's video, we discovered that her speech had run over the time limit. Therefore, the video of our 2nd place speaker, Sarah Huapaya, will be posted on Facebook for review by a panel of State Speech Trek judges.

The State Speech Trek judges will review the best speech from each participating branch and select five finalists, two of whom will be named as Honorable Mention. The top three finalists will compete for cash prizes at the state convention on Saturday, April 18, 2020, at the Westin San Francisco Airport Hotel. Travel expenses, lodging, and meals for each finalist and her/his chaperone will be

reimbursed by AAUW.

The first place winner at the state contest will receive \$1500. The second place winner at the state contest will receive \$1000, and the third place winner will receive \$500. The finalists who received honorable mention also receive cash prizes: \$250 for 4th place and \$150 for 5th place.

Among the capacity crowd were Dominique Rueda-flores, last year's statewide winner from Ramona Convent Secondary School, and US Congresswoman Judy Chu. Representative Chu presented a Certificate of Congressional Recognition. The certificate states, "In recognition of your high standards of excellence and outstanding achievements. Your dedication to help women and girls break down education and economic barriers is truly commendable. Your commitment to the youth of the greater San Gabriel Valley is deeply appreciated. Congratulations and best wishes in your future endeavors!"

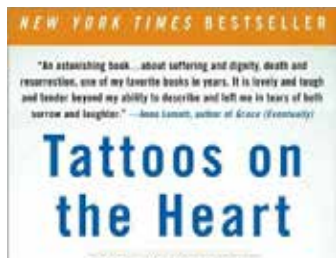

March 18 Books Group¹



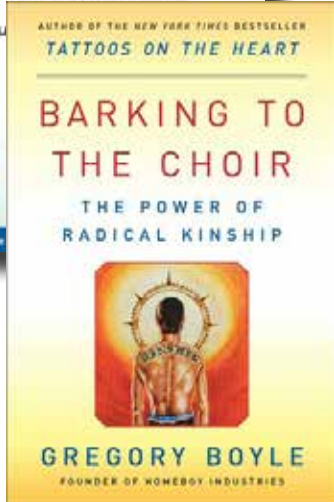
The book group will be discussing Father Gregory Boyle's two books.

In his first book, *Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion*, Gregory Boyle introduced us to Homeboy Industries, the largest gang-intervention program in the world. Critics hailed that book as an "astounding literary and spiritual feat" (Publishers Weekly) that is "destined to become a classic of both urban reportage and contemporary

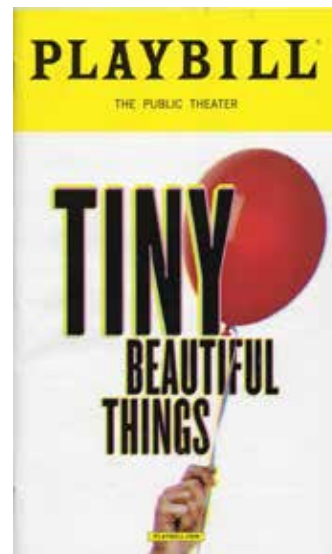
spirituality" (Los Angeles Times). Now, after the successful expansion of Homeboy Industries, Boyle returns with *Barking to the Choir* to reveal how compassion is transforming the lives of gang members.

In a nation deeply divided and plagued by poverty and violence, *Barking to the Choir* offers a snapshot into the challenges and joys of life on the margins. Sergio, arrested at age nine, in a gang by age twelve, and serving time shortly thereafter, now works with the substance-abuse team at Homeboy to help others find sobriety. Jamal, abandoned by his family when he tried to attend school at age seven, gradually finds forgiveness for his schizophrenic mother. New father Cuco, who never knew his own dad, thinks of a daily adventure on which to take his four-year-old son. These former gang members uplift the soul and reveal how bright life can be when filled with unconditional love and kindness.

These books are guaranteed to shake up our ideas about God and about people with a glimpse at a world defined by more compassion and fewer barriers.

Based on the best-selling book by Cheryl Strayed and adapted for the stage by Nia Vardalos, *Tiny Beautiful Things* personifies the questions and answers that "Sugar" was publishing online from 2010-2012. When the struggling writer was asked to take over the unpaid, anonymous position of advice columnist, Strayed used empathy and her personal experiences to help those seeking guidance for obstacles both large

and small. *Tiny Beautiful Things* is a play about reaching when you're stuck, healing when you're broken, and finding the courage to take on the questions which have no answers.
