Since a major election is around the corner, it seems to be the right moment to incorporate a bit of recent reading and share it with you.

It has come to be general knowledge that the hundred-year-old 19th Amendment mainly helped white women to access the

vote. Black women and other women of color continued to face discrimination and intimidation when they tried to assert their right to vote.

Even though Black women and other women of color supported the famous suffragists Susan B Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, they did not receive much, if any, recognition for their efforts. In the South, racial segregation statutes called Jim Crow laws also became forbidding obstacles to obtaining the vote. These restrictions were not officially lifted until **45 years after the 1920 ratification** with the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

One of the many Black women who established the suffragist movement offers us inspiration today in 2020. We are indebted to the sacrifices and heavy lifting she experienced and overcame to ensure that we and all women can choose our electoral leadership and governance. Let's get familiar with this role model and do further reading about her life.

She is the awesome Sojourner Truth.

She was a renowned speaker, a preacher, abolitionist and the **first known Black suffragist**. She was born in 1797 as Isabella Baumfree in Ulster County, New York, and enslaved until 1827. At the age of 30, she ran away to an abolitionist family who paid for her freedom, and became the wondrous Sojourner Truth. In 1851 she delivered her famous speech, "Ain't I a Woman?" Here excerpted:

"That man over there says that women need to be helped into carriages, and lifted over ditches, and to have the best place everywhere. Nobody ever helps me into carriages, or over mudpuddles, or gives me any best place! And ain't I a woman?

"Look at me! Look at my arm! I have ploughed and planted, and gathered into barns, and no man could head me! And ain't I a woman?

"If the first woman God ever made was strong enough to turn the world upside down all alone, these women together ought to be

able to turn it back, and get it right side up again! And now they is asking to do it, the men better let them."

So, let Sojourner be our guide as we push the envelope and inspire others to participate in this coming Election period. We still have time to Get Out The Vote (GOTV). No matter how you vote, it's our hard-fought right to vote. Get in touch with friends, family and your social media community. Make phone calls, write postcards, remind acquaintances you have not been in touch with for a while. And apply this African Proverb to yourself: "If you think you are too small to make a difference, you haven't spent a night with a mosquito."

Scholarships

Both committees welcome and encourage ideas and thoughts from our members as they go about their deliberations. Any branch member wishing help or wanting additional information is invited to call the committee chair.

Here are a few answers to the questions posed in the September *Mission Gateway*. I thought it was a good idea to do this. It gave me an opportunity to reflect on my 50 years with AAUW! This response will enable you get to better know me and other long-time members.

1. What motivated you to join AAUW?

I was first motivated to join AAUW by being asked to do so by a neighbor. This was long ago, as I have just been awarded 50-year Honorary Life Membership. I don't believe I was familiar with the organization although I have a faint memory of being invited to a reception by the Los Angeles Chapter of AAUW upon graduation from Immaculate Heart College. The branch owned their own home—imagine that! Incidentally, the proceeds from the sale of that home upon the closing of that branch is what supported Tech Trek scholarships for many years.

2. What values/activities within the Branch would you never want to see neglected or lost?

The values that I would not want to see lost naturally include those expressed in our mission: "To advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education and research." I support the educational mission of AAUW through AAUW Fund and am proud to be a member of the Legacy Circle which means I have pledged to remember AAUW in my trust.

Of course, I value our participation in Tech Trek and hope it can be restored soon. As a member of the Whittier Branch I've also been active in participating in the Math/Science Conference held on the Whittier College campus for 8th grade girls each January.

3. What have been, or are, your most meaningful interests and/or volunteer activities outside AAUW?

My most meaningful (outside AAUW) activities include: volunteering at the Monterey Park Library (on hiatus); being on the Laura Scudder Scholarship Committee (through the M.P. Historical Society); supporting scholarships at Roosevelt H.S. where I was a teacher and counselor for over 30 years; and being a member of the League of Women Voters-Pasadena and the Monterey Park Democratic Club.

4. (a) What are your limits to any branch commitment you might make that need to be considered? Health? Family?

(b) Because AAUW must be virtual for the time being, are there any technological limits you face (e.g., problems with Zoom, internet access, etc.)?

I've served in leadership capacity with the AAUW Montebello-Monterey Park Branch until its closure, and with the Greater Whittier Area Branch for the last 12 years. I have served with LA County Interbranch Council, and as a member of the AAUW CA public policy committee.

Public Policy: a Right and a Responsibility

Upon reading this issue of the *Mission Gateway*, we will be barely over a month away from this year's Presidential and Congressional elections. And there are a number of state and local elections, including CA Propositions that will garner our interest.

If you've not done so, please talk up the necessity of voting to all your family and friends, as well as anyone who will listen. Voting is a fundamental part of all that entails being a good citizen. Active participation in civic life is what's best for the country and our own communities. The "voice of the people" is heard loudest and with the most impact at election times. It is our opportunity to determine those individuals who will lead our country and our communities over the next 2, 4, or 6 years in the case of the U.S. Senate. It's that time when comments, complaints, suggestions, wants, needs, letters to our representatives and the like coalesce into one action: CASTING OUR VOTE.

The AAUW California's Public Policy Committee reviewed the ballot measures to see which ones are relevant to our public policy priorities and to our mission. There are seven that AAUW California supports based on this review. Five do not address issues relating to our priorities and mission. Those are listed as "no position."

More detailed information on each of these propositions, including who sponsored and who supports or opposes each, can be found on the Public Policy page of the AAUW California website.

The pros and cons of these propositions will be discussed in our October general meeting. I'd like to offer you a site where you can get a jump start on reading the pros and cons: CAVOTES.org. It's the CA League of Women Voters website filled with lots of accurate information. Once on the website scroll down a short way to Latest News under which you'll see PROS & CONS. There you'll find the 12 statewide propositions, each segment with the proposition followed by The Situation, The Proposal, Fiscal Effect, Statements of Support and Opposition along with Official Links to the Supporters & Opposers. You will get the full picture along with a link "How to Evaluate Ballot Propositions" which is compelling in its own right.

Vote by Mail Ballots are being mailed out in early October to every registered voter even if you have never voted by mail previously. Complete your ballot and drop it off at an early drop-off location or mail it (NO POSTAGE NECESSARY) back immediately. You can also drop it off on Election Day at your regular Polling Place or you can vote in-person on November 3. The only question you need to answer is how will you cast your vote.

November 3, 2020 is the time for everyone's voice to be heard locally, statewide and nationally!

October 28 **Why Public Policy Matters:** This workshop is for branches whose members are doing no or little public policy work; who do not have a public policy chair or committee; and who want to learn how to encourage members to engage in public policy projects, how to garner ideas for projects, and how to use PP to attract new members.

November 9 Keeping in Touch With Your Tech Trekkers - and Why You Should: Many branches keep in touch with their former Tech Trekkers. Some former campers have even built their own "Keep in Touch" groups. In this workshop you will learn how to track down and guide these young women through high school and college and, even, into their careers. The workshop will introduce these ideas - and the people working on them. Keeping your former Tech Trekkers close allows them to help you at branch events, mentor new campers, and keep in the loop about junior and senior counselor positions. You will be surprised how much your branch and these young women can help each other.

November 11 **Work Smarter not Harder:** Quality collaborations will benefit your branch and increase your influence. A collaboration isn't just about sharing work. It's about sharing resources. By investing your branch's time in building good relationships now, you can make them pay off for years to come.

Here is the latest update on Tech Trek from AAUW California:

"AAUW National announced that in the 2021 season, Tech Trek camps in all states must be delivered on a virtual platform. This decision was made due to the many unknowns and changing regulations, which are happening so rapidly that in-person events can not be advised this far in advance.

They also advised that all states should delay student recruitment until further into 2021.

As announced in prior communications, since the cancellation of our 2020 season, California Tech Trek has been working on alternative solutions, which includes a fully tested virtual platform option designed and implemented by our UC San Diego camp director. In addition, our delay of the student selection process to January 2021 aligns with the National decision.

While this announcement is certainly a disappointment, but not a surprise given the pandemic still actively impacting our country, the California Tech Trek Program leaders are fully prepared to continue the Tech Trek tradition by providing selected campers with a stimulating, fun and rewarding STEM virtual experience.

Rest assured that when the time is right, our goal is a return to the residential Tech Trek camp model that since 1998, has been AAUW California's premier STEM camp legacy.

California Tech Trek will not go dark in 2021 we're looking forward - and we appreciate your support and enthusiasm!"
