



#### PUBLIC POLICY COMMITTEE SETS 2024 LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

The Public Policy Committee met virtually over a weekend in early March to select the top ("A") bills that we will advance as our 2024 Legislative Agenda.

All of the bills on the agenda fall under at least one of our four <u>Public Policy Priority</u> pillars; one bill - AB 2349 - falls under three.

Excitingly, our signature "A" priority bill AB 2843 "Health Care Coverage for Rape and Sexual Assault Survivors" was authored by AAUW California. The bill is sponsored by AAUW California and falls under two of our Public Policy Priorities: "Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society" and "Economic Security for All Women." The bill eliminates cost-sharing, including deductibles, from being imposed on any rape survivor seeking medical care following a rape. (See the Lobby Days Talking Points and Bill Text for more details.)

Our second "A" priority bill, AB 2326 "Title IX Oversight and Compliance Act," is also sponsored by AAUW California. This bill falls under our Public Policy Priorities pillar "Equal Access to Quality Education for All Students" and champions something that AAUW California has long supported: Title IX enforcement. AB 2326 requires the Chancellors of the Community Colleges and State Universities and the President of the University of California to provide an annual report of their compliance with Title IX, with the report to be presented publicly and orally to the Senate and Assembly Budget Subcommittees on Higher Education Finance, a move to hold the systems, and their leaders, more publicly accountable.

Our third "A" priority bill is AB 2099, "Protecting Reproductive Health Clinics." This bill falls under our Public Policy Priorities pillar "Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society." The bill makes it possible for the D.A. to file a felony charge for sharing personal information or images of individuals such as reproductive health care providers or patients, with the intent of causing harm or violence against them, if the posting and subsequent action results in bodily injury. With violence against abortion providers continuing to rise following the reversal of Roe, the protection of providers and patients is now more important than ever.

Interesting fact, families select which camp they want to go to – there are still families a little apprehensive in sending girls to a residential camp and prefer to have an at home on the computer experience for virtual camp. And of course, in today's age students are very familiar and comfortable with computer learning. The Tech Trek State Director is the virtual camp director and she is fabulous with the girls.

CampDoc continues to be the working computer program for Tech Trek, all the selected campers are now completing necessary camp documents on-line. This is a great relief to Jane and Rozanne – we can go to CampDoc and see who needs to complete what document and then encourage the families to the process. The school liaisons continue to help us, if needed.

### DRAMA



<u>Marjorie Prime</u> - It's the age of artificial intelligence, but 86-year-old Marjorie is worried that her memory may be fading. That is until the appearance of Walter, a mysterious and charming young visitor programmed to help Marjorie uncover the intricacies of her own past. As Walter's true nature is revealed, new levels of complexity emerge, leading to profound questions about the limits of technology and whether memory might be a purely human invention.

<u>Morning's at Seven</u> - Its plot focuses on four aging sisters living in a small Midwestern town in 1928, and it deals with ramifications within the family when two of them begin to question their lives and decide to make some changes before it's too late.

Olivia McAfee knows what it feels like to start over. Her picture-perfect life—living in Boston, married to a brilliant cardiothoracic surgeon, raising a beautiful son, Asher—was upended when her husband revealed a darker side. She never imagined she would end up back in her sleepy New Hampshire hometown, living in the house she grew

up in, and taking over her father's beekeeping business.

Lily Campanello is familiar with do-overs, too. When she and her mom relocate to Adams, New Hampshire, for her final year of high school, they both hope it will be a fresh start.

And for just a short while, these new beginnings are exactly what Olivia and Lily need. Their paths cross when Asher falls for the new girl in school, and Lily can't help but fall for him, too. With Ash, she feels happy for the first time. Yet at times, she wonders if she can she trust him completely...

Then one day, Olivia receives a phone call: Lily is dead, and Asher is being questioned by the police. Olivia is adamant that her son is innocent. But she would be lying if she didn't acknowledge the flashes of his father's temper in him, and as the case against him unfolds, she realizes he's hidden more than he's shared with her. **Evening Books** will meet Monday, May 27, 2024 to review <u>Ask Again, Yes</u> by Mary Beth Keane and Monday June 24, 2024, to review <u>Demon Copperhead</u> by Barbara Kingsolver. Both gatherings will convene at 7:00 pm.



Francis Gleeson and Brian Stanhope, two rookie cops in the NYPD, live next door to each other outside the city. What happens behind closed doors in both houses—the loneliness of Francis's wife, Lena, and the instability of Brian's wife, Anne—sets the stage for explosive events to come.

Ask Again, Yes is a moving novel about two families, the bond between their children, a tragedy that reverberates over four decades, the daily intimacies of marriage, and the power of forgiveness.



Set in the mountains of southern Appalachia, this is the story of a boy born to a teenaged single mother in a single-wide trailer, with no assets beyond his dead father's good looks and copper-colored hair, a caustic wit, and a fierce talent for survival. In a plot that never pauses for breath, relayed in his own unsparing voice, he braves the modern perils of foster care, child

labor, derelict schools, athletic success, addiction, disastrous loves, and crushing losses. Through all of it, he reckons with his own invisibility in a popular culture where even the superheroes have abandoned rural people in favor of cities.

Many generations ago, Charles Dickens wrote <u>David Copperfield</u> from his experience as a survivor of institutional poverty and its damages to children in his society. Those problems have yet to be solved in ours. Dickens is not a prerequisite for readers of this novel, but he provided its inspiration. In transposing a Victorian epic novel to the contemporary American South, Barbara Kingsolver enlists Dickens' anger and compassion, and above all, his faith in the transformative powers of a good story. <u>Demon Copperhead</u> speaks for a new generation of lost boys, and all those born into beautiful, cursed places they can't imagine leaving behind.
