Kyoko Nancy Oda author of Tule Lake Stockade Diary

We are excited to invite Kyoko Nancy Oda, as our speaker for the January 18, 2025 Authors Luncheon. She will introduce her translation of her grandfather's journal, Tule Lake Stockade Diary, when he was incarcerated at Tule Lake Camp during WWII. The following description was written by the author. I could not choose any more eloquent words than these:

"My story is part of the American fabric that many of us have. Growing up with a diverse group of neighbors on Folsom St. in ELA impacted my world vision. I never experienced any problems going from a concentration camp to Maryknoll School to Garfield. Yes, I'm a bulldog. When the Belvedere Citizen newspaper wanted to interview my father and mother, they were reluctant. I begged them to tell their feelings about Pearl Harbor, since that was the topic, from a Japanese American point of view.

I was AP at Haddon Avenue School in Pacoima and deeply believed in my Title 1 students who meant the world to me. Tangee Mason* was the principal. We were 50 years old then.

The book became a family project in 2020 although I began to translate it in 1970 for a class assignment at UCLA. This year, my grandchildren came to the Tule Lake pilgrimage with the family."

Reverence for the Past Advocacy for the Future

In nineteenth-century America, entomologist Margaretta Hare Morris was famous for her discovery that cicada Larvae feasted on the roots of trees, her controversial theories about wheat flies, and her observations of water beetles transporting fish eggs from lake to lake. Her sister, Elizabeth Carrington Morris, was a prolific science writer and a trusted supplier of specimens to the country's leading experts. Yet Margaretta and Elizabeth – like the many other women who labored alongside

Marilee Wood them – are little known today.

Despite their discoveries and contributions, the sisters routinely found themselves patronized and dismissed by their male colleagues. But their work nevertheless helped fuel the growth of science in antebellum America as it increasingly became the domain of institutions and professionals rather than amateurs and enthusiasts. Ironically, these developments pushed women in science into underpaid and underappreciated roles for generations to follow, erasing the Morris sisters' legacy along the way.

Later in her career, Margaretta would be one of the first women elected to the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and she and Elizabeth were in conversation with Charles Darwin, Asa Gray, Louis Agassiz, and other major scientists who benefited from their discoveries. The path to that hard won recognition began with those tiny wheat flies.

Our strength comes from our collective voice, and together we will continue the work to support women's education and economic empowerment.

Tech Trek Update January

Tech Trek North and Tech Trek South are gearing up for the 2025 camp season. Jane and I have made initial contacts with the schools and will follow up in January with specific instructions. TT North is sending 6 campers and TT South is sending 11 campers.

You might be interested in how campers are selected. Campers are recommended by the science or math teacher. Parents must give their authorization for their child to participate in Tech Trek before receiving any information from CampDocs. CampDocs is the online program that the campers use to apply for camp. As branch coordinators we have access to CampDocs so we can help the campers with the application process if something is missing or incomplete. When the campers have completed the application process they write an essay. Tech Trek North and South branch committee read the applications, teacher recommendations, and essays. The final step occurs when the committees interview and select the campers.


Day Books will meet Wednesday, January 15, 2025, at 1:00 p.m. to review <u>The Patron Saint of Liars</u> by Ann Patchett.


