

#### USAF Jet Fighter Pilot (Retired Colonel) Martha McSally

USAF Jet Fighter Pilot (Retired Colonel) Martha McSally earned her USAF pilot's wings in 1991 after completing Undergraduate Pilot Training At William Air Force Base east of Phoenix. Following graduation, she was assigned to Laughlin Air Force Base, Texas, as a First Assignment Instructor Pilot in the T-37 trainer. McSally went on to Lead-in Fighter Training in 1993.

McSally then completed Replacement Training Unit for the A-10 Thunderbolt II at Davis–Monthan Air Force Base and was assigned to an operational A-10 squadron that deployed to Kuwait in January 1995. During this deployment, she flew combat patrol over Iraq in support of Operation Southern Watch, enforcing the no-fly zone over southern Iraq and becoming "the first female U.S. fighter pilot to fly in combat and the first woman to command a fighter squadron."

In 1999, McSally deployed to Europe in support of Operation Allied Force. She was selected as one of seven active-duty Air Force officers for the Legislative Fellowship Program. She lived in Washington, D.C., working as a national security advisor to Senator Jon Kyl (R-AZ).

McSally took command of the 354th Fighter Squadron at Davis–Monthan Air Force Base in July 2004. She was subsequently deployed to Afghanistan during Operation Enduring Freedom. In 2006, McSally's squadron won the David C. Shilling Award, given by the Air Force Association "for the most outstanding contribution in the field of flight".

#### **IMPLEMENTATION OF PROJECT 2025**

#### Our core values are under attack. Take action now.

As Co-Directors Amy Hom and Missy Maceyko outlined in a <u>webinar</u> in October 2024, the objectives of Project 2025 directly counter the Public Policy Priorities of AAUW California. **With federal policy pronouncements and changes continuing to take place at a head-spinning pace,** it is clear that changes are underway to make Project 2025 become reality (track implementation <u>HERE</u>). To respond to the attack on the people and issues we care about and to fulfill the mission of our organization, "to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, and research," we will continue to compile resources to help you take action to fight back. This is a critical moment, as the changes that are being implemented may have long-lasting impacts, locally and globally.

Even as we are asking you to act, **we want to remind you that your well-being is important.** With an uptick in policies and enforcement actions that run counter to our core values, you may be feeling overwhelmed, exhausted, fearful, or anxious. Action is important, but <u>self-care is also a political act</u>. Be gentle with yourself and acknowledge your efforts.

We also encourage you to <u>check out this guide</u> on how to read the news more strategically to still be able to follow events while preventing burnout and protecting your mental health.

You should also consider **staying connected** with AAUW members and with those outside of AAUW who are engaged in efforts to push back. To this end, here are some examples of individuals, groups, and organizations that are pushing back in different ways:

- direct refusal to comply, via mass resignation,
- showing up in person not only to protest but also to support, including showing love for beleaguered federal workers at USAID,
- initiating and sustaining legal challenges.

AAUW California is building out our own action-items database, which is being released to the California Leadership Team to review in March and which will go live for you in April. **Regardless, we will continue to provide a short list of targeted resources each month.** 

We ask you to take action by choosing one self-focused, one other-focused, and one political-focused item from the list below. This month the topic area is:

#### TAKE ACTION: SEXUAL ASSAULT VIOLENCE PREVENTION

#### **Self-Focused: Education**

- learn more about the organizations country-wide that are on the front lines of dealing with sexual assault violence
- read through the resources provided by the Domestic Violence Awareness Project and the CDC.

#### **Other-Focused: Education & Connection**

- whatever you take away from your homework in self-education--be sure to tell one friend about what you learned. You can do this over lunch.
- work with others to organize an event\_to raise awareness and dispel myths around gender-based and sexual assault violence in your community.

#### **Politically-Focused: Outreach to Senators**

• Use <u>5-calls</u> to reach out to federal legislators to oppose the abolition of the Department of Education, which will impact enforcement of existing sexual and gender-based violence protections under Title IX.

 text SIGN PNNWWO to 50409 to contact legislators, urging them to back efforts to get money flowing to relevant organizations and programs to raise awareness about and prevent sexual assault violence (e.g. <u>Department of Justice, Office of Violence Against Women</u>). #### Lobby Days 2025, April 8-9, 2025

We have had overwhelming interest in this year's Lobby Days event, with 77 people registered to participate in person at the Capitol on April 8th and 107 people registered to participate via Zoom on April 9th! It is incredibly inspiring and humbling to be part of an organization that is so passionate about advocating to make the world better for women and girls. We are grateful.

The Public Policy Committee is now hard at work to form teams and schedule meetings, as well as evaluate bills for our 2025 Legislative Agenda.


Drama group will gather April 14th at 7:00 p.m. to read Rose's Dilemma by Neil Simon

June 1940. France has fallen to the Nazis, and Britain may be next--but to many Americans, the war is something happening "over there." Veronica Grace has just graduated from college; she and her mother, Violet, are looking for a fresh start in sunny Los Angeles. After

a blunder cost her a prestigious career opportunity in New York, Veronica is relieved to take a typing job in L.A.--only to realize that she's working for one of the area's most vicious propagandists.

Overnight, Veronica is exposed to the dark underbelly of her new home, where German Nazis are recruiting Americans for their devastating campaign. After the FBI dismisses the Graces' concerns, Veronica and Violet decide to call on an old friend, who introduces them to L.A.'s anti-Nazi spymaster.

At once, the women go undercover to gather enough information about the California Reich to take to the authorities. But as the news of Pearl Harbor ripples through the United States, and President Roosevelt declares war, the Grace women realize that the plots they're investigating are far more sinister than they feared--and even a single misstep could cost them everything.

Inspired by the real mother-daughter spy duo who foiled Nazi plots in Los Angeles during WWII, Mother Daughter Traitor Spy is a powerful portrait of family, duty, and deception that raises timeless questions about America--and what it means to have courage in the face of terror.



Lauren Olamina and her family live in one of the only safe neighborhoods remaining on the outskirts of Los Angeles. Behind the walls of their defended enclave, Lauren's father, a preacher, and a handful of other citizens try to salvage what remains of a culture that has been destroyed by drugs, disease, war, and chronic water shortages. While her father tries

to lead people on the righteous path, Lauren struggles with hyper-empathy, a condition that makes her extraordinarily sensitive to the pain of others.

When fire destroys their compound, Lauren's family is killed and she is forced out into a world that is fraught with danger. With a handful of other refugees, Lauren must make her way north to safety, along the way conceiving a revolutionary idea that may mean salvation for all mankind.
