AAUW California Public Policy Shares Education-Focused,

Nonpartisan Guidance on Proposition 50

AAUW California released nonpartisan voter-education information to help Californians understand Proposition 50, a statewide ballot measure on the November 4, 2025, special election. Consistent with the organization's mission and public policy priorities, this resource focuses on how the Proposition would alter the redistricting process for California's congressional districts and provides authoritative, neutral sources for further information.

"Although illegal midterm redistricting efforts outside California may seem like a federal issue, they are now directly relevant to Californians," said Amy Hom, a former engineer and co-chair of AAUW California's Public Policy Committee. "California continues to maintain strong protections for women and girls, marginalized people, free speech, accurate history, sound science, and democratic norms," Hom said. "However, Californians remain subject

to the laws, rules, and enforcement actions of a federal government influenced by the directives of Project 2025 rather than the will of the people," she added.

AAUW California shared that Proposition 50 can preserve the state's ability to serve all Californians in the face of overwhelming federal encroachment. The approval of Proposition 50 by California voters can help combat illegal efforts to silence opposition voices and advance an executive agenda heavily influenced by <u>Project 2025</u>².

Approval of Proposition 50 can aid in this endeavor by approving redistricting efforts in California for the subsequent election cycles, until maps are redrawn after the next census in 2030, which will only be triggered as a proportional response. AAUW California supports all efforts to preserve and advance democracy, in conjunction with its public policy priorities focused on gender-based equity and social justice.

"While this kind of redistricting response is often framed as an escalation of a partisan conflict, in the current political environment, we should think carefully about what is being labeled as partisan," said Dr. Melissa (Missy) Maceyko, an expert in effective social change and political action, and co-chair of AAUW California's Public Policy Committee. "Partisan labeling can be reductive when the choice has become one of supporting authoritarianism or preserving functional democracy and protecting the rights of all people," she added.

AAUW California seeks to educate voters on Proposition 50. The organization is reminding all Californians that support for Proposition 50 is a non-partisan move to preserve broader democratic norms in California; to oppose the implementation of Project 2025 in California; and to continue advancing gender equity, including through AAUW California's mission and public policy priorities.


Membership Corner

Branch Presents Women Advancing DEI Initiatives.

The Alhambra San Gabriel branch's Brave Resilient Women (BRW) joined in presenting an exciting project with the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) committee to present "Women Advancing DEI Initiatives, A Panel Presentation." Janice Lee. DEI Chair, launched the program, held at the first Methodist Church in Alhambra on October 18, by underscoring AAUW's long history of promoting equity and recently adopting a DEI strategic plan for its branches. This includes exploring diversity in health, elder rights (ageism) and education and race.

Janice also explained that "Intersectionality is a framework for understanding how various aspects of a person's social and political identities combine to create unique experiences of discrimination or privilege. It highlights how race, class, gender, sexual orientation, and other social categorizations can overlap and create unique experiences of oppression."

Betty Morín, BRW chair, opened the panel by introducing its three speakers and their DEI themes. Kathleen Doty introduced us to two women who furthered the rights of women in healthcare, Elizabeth Blackwell, and Dr. Helen Rodriguez-Trios. Jackie Fisher described the successes and challenges of Maggie Kuhn, creator of the Gray Panthers and Judy Chu, our representative in Congress, who has fought to expand the rights of elders and protect their Social Security and pensions. Elena Velarde introduced us to two women who, through their research and practice, expanded equitable access, in education, Dr. Lisa D. Delpit, and Dr. Juliet V. Garcia.

DEI Chair, Janice Lee urged members to consider sharing their personal experiences with health issues, elder rights and race in a new column in our branch's newsletter. She introduced Diane Askew, who related her personal struggle against ageism. After taking the licensing exam in her field nine times and failing by only a few points each time, Diane decided to hire a lawyer. Through the courts, records of the exams were opened and revealed subjectivity and bias toward ageism. "Subsequently the licensing board was forced to make the process more objective and not subject to biases of the examiners," Diane said. She took the exam again and passed. Several of her colleagues followed her example and were also successful.

After the presentation, a lively discussion took place. One member brought up the difficulty that the DEI message is experiencing in society today. Others in the group admitted that possibly the name DEI might go away, but that the principles behind it of fairness and justice will prevail. The meeting ended on a high note of hope for diversity and equity for the future.

On Tuesday, October 7th, Public Policy Co-chairs Missy Maceyko and Amy Hom presented a webinar titled Project 2025 Impacts on AAUW Values - One Year Later: How to Stop Ongoing Implementation". The presentation revisited last year's webinar, Project 2025 and How It Would Impact AAUW Public Policy Priorities, providing sobering updates on the rapid pace and extent of the Trump administration's implementation of many of the policy predictions. The session also offered concrete strategies for collective action to slow and resist Project 2025's rollout - beginning with the 2025 Special Election GOTV education on the positive impacts of California Proposition 50. Unable to sleep, Elaine Wheeler paces the living room of her Manhattan townhouse, troubled by unsettling memories and vague fears. Her husband tries to comfort her, but when he steps away for a moment Elaine screams as she sees (or believes she sees) the body of a dead man in the window across the way. The police are called, but find nothing except

an empty chair. Elaine's terror grows as shortly thereafter she sees still another body—this time a woman's—but by now the police are skeptical and pay no heed to her frantic pleas. Her husband, claiming that Elaine may be on the verge of a breakdown, calls in a lady psychiatrist, who agrees with his suggestion that Elaine should commit herself to a sanitarium for treatment. From this point on, the plot moves quickly and grippingly as those involved—Elaine's old friend and house guest Blanche; the inquisitive and rather sinister man who lives next door; and the nosy German maid Helga—all contribute to the deepening suspense and mystery of the play as it draws towards its riveting and chilling climax. A drama for a cast of 5 men and 4 women.


The Turnaway Play is about what really happens when people are denied access to abortion. An urgent issue comes to life onstage through humor, drama, and audience participation.

The play is inspired and informed by the ground-breaking Turnaway Study, conducted by Dr. Diana Greene Foster, a 2023 MacArthur Fellow and researcher at the University of California, San Francisco. Dr. Foster followed 1,000 women from across the country for five years and obtained the first scientific results on the consequences people face when either having or being denied an abortion. The main finding of the Turnaway Study is that receiving an abortion does not harm the health and wellbeing of women, but in fact, being denied an abortion results in worse financial, health and family outcomes.

Characters in the play are based on Turnaway Study subjects and members of the research team. The play uses the words and experiences of these real people to bust myths and reduce abortion stigma. Drama, humor, and audience participation make it an engaging and thought-provoking theatrical event.

pulls an all-nighter, saves a life or two, crashes a high-society event, meets a kindred spirit, faces a former rival, makes a new friend, takes a stroll with a future movie mogul, advises a troubled newlywed, and reflects upon a life well her own!



Frank Szatowski is shocked when his daughter, Maggie, calls him for the first time in three years. He was convinced that their estrangement would become permanent. He's even more surprised when she invites him to her upcoming wedding in New Hampshire. Frank is ecstatic, and determined to finally make things right.

He arrives to find that the wedding is at a private estate—very secluded, very luxurious, very much out of his league. It seems that Maggie failed to mention that she's marrying Aidan Gardner, the son of a famous tech billionaire. Feeling desperately out of place, Frank focuses on reconnecting with Maggie and getting to know her new family. But it's difficult: Aidan is withdrawn and evasive; Maggie doesn't seem to have time for him; and he finds that the locals are disturbingly hostile to the Gardners. Frank needs to know more about this family his daughter is marrying into, but if he pushes too hard, he could lose Maggie forever.
