Last month, the Trump administration took a major step toward dismantling the U.S. Department of Education (ED). All eleven schools in the TT South area have been contacted and have agreed to work in recruiting 7th grade girls to the program. Schools will receive further information in January on the process. Tech North has also contacted nine Tech Trek North schools and Jefferson Middle School in San Gabriel about Tech Trek summer camps for 2026. The TT North schools will receive further information in January.

I have some wonderful news about the TTAG Tech Trek Alumnae group. We had a holiday party on Saturday, December 6th. Thirteen girls, parents plus Marilee Wood and Jane Krause were in attendance. Let's learn from one another — one story at a time. **Our first story is shared by our own President Marilee Wood:**

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion – Encountering Sexism and Ageism

January 22, 2023, I was elected President of my condo's HOA. Our parking garage was under assault by gang members climbing over our security walls and smashing car windows, looking for valuables. Video cameras taped them damaging 4-5 cars on each occurrence. The damages occurred from 2:30am to 5:30am and residents were concerned for their safety.

As a new president, I recommended that we add height to our security walls and make the parking lot entrance doors difficult to climb over to gain entry. I made an appointment with the Alhambra Planning Commission as this change would require approval from the city. Adding height to the walls would mean going over the allowed height of fencing.

At the planning commission I met with a man of about 50-55 years. I explained our problem to him. The whole time I was speaking, he would not look me in the eyes. He stared at a general contractor who was behind me. When he responded to my request, he looked at the general contractor, as if he was in charge of our job. He assumed that I certainly couldn't be handling this modification.

I looked him straight in the eyes and said, "Hey, I'm talking to you. And you can talk to me, not the man behind me."

He discouraged me from raising the height of our fence. He said it would never get approved and that it would not stop the vandalism. He told me to go door to door of every building surrounding our property and tell parents to keep their children home at night. Insane.

An intern was assigned to our modification plan. She was a young woman, fresh out of college. I shared my experience with her and between the two of us, we determined that we would make this happen. There were many steps to complete this project; planning applications, permits, noticing neighbors, photos of desired fencing, and engineering and architectural drawings (which I completed myself with no experience).

Step by step, with the assistance of my intern, we jumped through many hoops and completed the planning applications. Finally, we were approved. We raised our fence to the added height allowed by the special permit. The finished product was beautiful and added to the appeal of our building. AND, the break-ins stopped. We haven't had any vandalism since our fence was raised.

What I learned: 1) When a man diminishes a woman in conversation, speak right up and call him on it. He may not like it, but you will feel better standing your ground and treating yourself as an equal to his authority. 2) When someone in authority minimizes your request, take notes as accurately as you can. When you have done the job done well, write a letter to the supervisor. Let them know that their representative did not measure up to their responsibility.



Later, as the country reconstructs in the postwar boom, a secret grows in Bonhomie—but nothing stays buried forever in a small town.
